Four Lessons for Writing Engaging Nonfiction

Lesson 1: Write Your Truth

 Activity: Perspective Walk- Take students on a 5-10 minute walk around campus without explaining the purpose. When you return, have students write the story of their walk.
 Have students share and use the variance in the accounts to demonstrate the difference between relative and ultimate truth.

Lesson 2: Build the Reservoir

- Activities: Over a period of time, have students make lists, write to prompts, keep writers' notebooks, and mine social media posts so that they have plenty of ideas to draw from for an engaging personal essay.
- Example: Make a T-Chart List, on the left, list five of the most interesting people you've ever met. On the right, list the characteristics which make those people so interesting.

Lesson 3: Put the Regder in Your Shoes

- Activity: Write in active scenes. Just like
 movie scenes, narrative scenes have a
 beginning and an end, and something
 happens in between. Use action, dialogue and
 active verbs to show rather than tell.
- Example: Choose an interesting person from your list. Write a brief, active scene which shows that person demonstrating one of his/her interesting characteristics.

Lesson 4: Frame it Right

- Activity: Evaluating First-lines- To help students consider the power of first lines, choose an anthology (like the Best American Essays), read some actual opening lines to students and have them rank their interest from 1-5. After they've explained why, read the rest of the opening paragraph and have them give a thumbs up or a thumbs down as to whether their interest increased or decreased.
- And remember Jane Bernstein's suggested advice for an unspoken last line: "And nothing was the same after that." If students can put that at the end of a personal essay, they're done.
